Fast French Polish - review

The demo for our May meeting was excellent. If you missed it you missed a very good demonstration on a version of a French polish finish. Local craftsman of hand made guitars and member of the guild Robbie O'Brien was our demonstrator. He teaches the guitar making classes and is the head of the guitar-building department at Red Rocks Community College. We were privileged to have him to show us his version of a French polish, which he uses on his instruments. This finish would also work for other small projects.

The finish is a shellac finish, which is a subject on its own that could take an entire meeting and then some. The basics are as follows:

The recipe or formula if you will is a 1 lb. Cut, which is 1 lb. of shellac flakes to one gallon of alcohol. So you can adjust the amounts from this recipe.

You take the shellac flakes and grind them to a powder and mix with the alcohol. It was suggested a coffee grinder works very well for this. (Not the same coffee grinder you use for your coffee)

One thing to mention would be that rather than using regular alcohol Robbie uses a mixture of shellac and "Ever clear" Yes the very high proof alcohol you buy at the liquor store. This is because this high proof alcohol "flashes off" or evaporates very quickly. He was able to demonstrate this in living color on the large screens and it was very impressive and really is convincing that using ever clear is very important to this procedure.

It was emphasized that surface preparation was key. First step to fill the pores of open pored woods and that even dyed dry wall compound is an option when doing this step.

After this is done you would do the first coat of shellac called the seal coat. This coat is applied with the grain. The applicator is an inner and outer pad. Inner pad is cheesecloth and the outer pad is linen. The pad is loaded with the shellac and very lightly applied in layers. The layers dry very quickly and more thin layers are applied one on top of another. Once you have built up an initial seal coat you can then apply in a circular motion and as it starts to feel tacky you can use a drop of olive oil to lubricate the pad. Olive oil will rise to the top as the finish dries and can be removed. It will not become part of the finish.

Steps:

- 1. Seal coat- with the grain using the inner pad (cheesecloth)
- 2. Charge the outer pad (linen) by twisting it around inner pad, and begin swirl application of finish. When finish gets sticky use lube (olive oil) resume circular application. When it starts getting sticky again go with the grain to remove swirl marks.
 - 3. Repeat this 3 to 5 times.
 - 4. Level with sandpaper (Wet/Dry 1000 grit)
 - 5. Repeat steps 1 through 4

You can keep dong this until you have the finish you desire.

In a fast 30 minutes he finished the piece of wood he was using to glass sheen! It was very impressive.

This is definitely a wonderful finish and is worth exploring for future projects.
