way of conveying an idea to someone (see photo). Ken goes on to tell us that they try to complete the total designer by giving them a good foundation in giving presentations, photography, various



materials studies, human factors, graphics, etc. We would like to thank Mr. Phillips for coming out during a hectic time of the school year to give us this excellent presentation.

These are some examples from past years.

September Mini Demo - Paul Seipel and Flocking -

We've all made boxes. But what have we done with the insides of them? Painted them just to make them different. Left them alone. Finished them to match the outside of the box. Attempted to lay felt inside. Covered cardboard pieces in felt or fabric. But never flocking! Far too messy or hard!



Doesn't hold up! These are all LIES!! In fact Paul showed us just how ridiculously EASY flocking is! A simple cardboard box contains the castoff which can be reused later. The adhesive paints on with little need for precision (although you do want full coverage of the area) and doesn't dry so fast that you have to hurry. In fact the short setup time actually takes longer that the flocking process itself. And durability is its middle name. The flocking "fur" is Rayon or Nylon and the adhesive is very sturdy when dry. Quite honestly it's the simplest and most beautiful solution to the interior of a box, jewelry drawer, toolbox, car dashboards, almost anything. The investment is small and the colors are varied, 34 shades. Check out www.Flockit.com for the source.

Paul gives regular demos on the process but I'm sure any of you needs no real instruction. Its EXTREMELY easy and the rewards are amazing.

He was kind enough to bring a template which I converted into printable pattern that you can download on our website. You need to log in first them go the DOCUMENTS menu and click on WOODWORKING PLANS when it expands down. The Turtle Stool plan will be the first one on the list. You will need the FREE Adobe Acrobat Reader to print it. When you open it with Acrobat click the printer icon and a window will open. Look PAGE SCALING in that window and set it to NONE so that the pattern prints the proper size. There are 2 pages, one for the legs and head, one for the body. If you would like to make a larger version of this stool and cannot figure out how to enlarge it on your own contact me and I will be able to help.


simple as it looks and 2) glass is a lot more unforgiving than wood to work with.

Dust Deputy - Tool Review

It seems that within my workshop the random orbital sander gets a lot of work time and as I do not like dust filled air: it is attached to a shop vac to pull off the dust and keep it contained. While that process works very well, the shop vac filter clogs rapidly with all that fine dust and the air flow becomes restricted. The Cyclone Dust Deputy from Oneida Air



Systems (http://www.dustdeputy.com/) has provided an answer for this problem. This attachment to your shop vac provides a low cost solution to the fine dust clogging the filter in your shop vac. This cyclone fits



on top of a five gallon plastic pail and that could make the shop vac more difficult to move about. The solution that I came up with was a small platform attached to the shop vac. The platform has a single dolly wheel under it to keep it all level and portable.
