President's Message

What is your vision?



You know, some have estimated that there are at least 10 million woodworkers in the United States. Though a majority of these may not belong to an organization like the Colorado Woodworkers Guild, many do. In the Colorado front range (from Colorado Springs to Fort Collins) alone there are at least six to ten different organizations

accommodating furniture makers, musical instrument makers, turners, shipwrights, carvers and tool collectors. Most of these have a specific focus or vision. The Colorado Woodworkers Guild is one of these groups, but our focus or mission is more general. We welcome all of these disciplines or interest areas, especially when we can see them combined or interrelated.

So, what is our vision? What kind of an organization do we want? We have spent little time discussing our shared, collective vision—a view of what we want the organization to be like in one year, two years, or more. So, here, in a few column inches in our newsletter, perhaps I can contribute a few ideas toward a shared vision.

A vision is not difficult to construct. Simply ask yourself these questions: "What should this organization be like in one year? In five years? How many members should we strive for? What kind of topics and activities should we address in our programs? How many and what committees should we have? What age groups should we accommodate? Should we offer activities for all skill levels from novice to professional? And many more.

My vision of the Guild cannot be captured in a single sentence. Instead, the following statements describe how the Guild might appear in perhaps 2-3 years:

I encourage you to think on this and contribute your thoughts to me. Together we can form this vision to guide the Guild forward. I will be looking for your thoughts.



February Presentation

Brian Odermatt (http://www.bpowoodcarving.com/) has developed a successful wood carving business in the Denver Metro area.

His primary method is power carving; but, uses a wide range of hand tools as well. His university education was in art and this is most evident in the range and quality of his work. Brian comes from a Swiss family that has a long history of professional carvers within it.

His emphasis on Colorado wildlife and outdoor scenes has brought him awards from Cowboys and Indians magazine. He will be a feature carver at the Creede Wood Carvers rendezvous where he will be a featured artist and instructor sharing his skills. The rendezvous will be on July 10th to the 17th this year.



Brian demonstrated various power carving tools, techniques, and approaches to the art. His wide range of knowledge was impressive and we hope to have him back in the future for some further insights.

March Presentation

Julie Simon will be our presenter at the March Meeting. Their line of clear finishes includes a range of product technologies: Polyurethane, Pre-Catalyzed, Post-Catalyzed, Acrylic, and nitrocellulose. Julie will provide us methods used to choose the right finish for your project and a wealth of information on application. She will bring one of M.L. Campbell's factory specialists to the meeting with her. Her enthusiam and excellent technical knowledge will provide us a lot of insights into the process of finishing a project.



May Presentation

The topic for our May meeting will be sustainable forestry and the speaker is Bob Sturtevant from the Forestry Department at Colorado State University.

He will cover how the production of lumber is managed so that the amount of forest is not depleted. In addition he will cover the Pine Beetle problem in Colorado and how the lumber being harvested as part of the beetle control solution is being cycled into the market place. He will deal with the blue stain and how that effects the strength of the lumber.



Cabinetry Class for Charity

The Colorado Woodworking Guild has developed a class/project effort to both teach cabinet making and deliver kitchen cabinets to a charity as part of the effort. The Charity is the Inn Between in Longmont, a transistional housing unit.

He was the editor of Woodworker (London) from 1935-1968. He also lectured on the subject at Shoreditch Training College in the late 30s. Hayward was a prolific writer having authored, edited or contributed to 36 books. His books are well written with sufficient illustrations and explanations. His books can be had via Ebay and used bookstores for only a few dollars, which makes them a great value.

February Mini Demo

I did a short demonstration about the basic set up and use of an electrolysis tank. For those looking for more specifics I have provided details that should save you some time.

February Mini Demo cont.

First, use a non-conductive container such as a 5-gal plastic bucket or for long items you could make a long box and use a plastic bag as a liner. Then you will need the electrolyte bath, which is tap water with a ratio of 1/3 cup of Washing Soda to 5 gallons of water. Your sacrificial electrode should be cheap and non-alloyed (re-bar is a good choice). Don't use stainless steel. Next is the power supply. You want a low voltage higher amperage DC power supply (PS). My PS is for a computer and has an output of 12.5 volts at 12 amps. Car battery chargers also work. The proper connections are as follows: (+) leads to the sacrificial electrode (re-bar) and (-) leads to the items to be cleaned. The clips attaching the (+) leads should be out of the water. The connection for the (-) terminals is dependent on the object to be cleaned. You can use a metal basket for lots of small parts or baling wire looped around for large individual objects. Place the item to be cleaned in the center of the tank and have the sacrificial electrodes around the perimeter of the tank. This process is affected by the proximity of the electrodes to the object. If the piece is too close to one of the electrodes you will be effectively shorting the power supply. The time required depends on several factors, to include the output of the power supply, the proximity to the electrodes and the amount of surface area to be cleaned. Some precautions to consider when setting up are that this process produces hydrogen and oxygen gases, which are both highly flammable so ventilation is essential. Also this is electricity and water, which can be harmful to you and the power supply if vou are not careful.

CWG Logo Contest

Your board has agreed that the Colorado Woodworkers Guild needs a new logo. We currently have two logos in use. We have some excellent design talent within the Guild, so your board thinks a logo contest will work to give us new logo. In April we will kick off the contest! As you begin to develop ideas, here are the logo guidelines:

- Keep it Simple: is the soul of an effective visual identity. And, your logo design must be scalable, that is, be designed so that you can shrink (like for a business card) or expand it and still be legible and recognizable.
- Typeface: Your font's legibility must be of primary concern. Select a typeface that is common to most computer operating systems.
- Black and White: Consider how your logo design will look when it is rendered in only black and white.
- Colors: Every additional color in your logo design can add significantly to your printing costs. Keeping your logo in fewer colors will greatly reduce your expense when applying your logo to different mediums such as signage for instance.
- Slogan or Tagline: A slogan or tagline can complement your logo well, imparting a sense of personality and what your organization is all about.

■ File Formats: File formats are also very important. Vector based is best to ensure scalability without sacrificing sharpness and clarity or reducing in resolution.

At the April kickoff, we will provide the final rules, including information about how the selection will be made. So, get your creative energies moving!
