Guild Member's Shop Tour

On Saturday, March 19th about 15 Guild members went on a tour of 4 member's shops in the Parker/ Elizabeth area.

The first stop was at Jeff Roth's shop. His shop is large, approximately 2000 sq. ft. and was once a dairy barn. Jeff has used the space to his advantage, with plenty of space between tools, large worktables and outfeed tables on his two table saws, one of which is a Sawstop. Along with his power tools, he also has a very nice hand tool cabinet that holds a good selection of tools, some of which are heirlooms passed



down to him through his family.

Jeff also allowed us into his home, where he showed us several beautiful pieces he has built, mostly in an Arts and Crafts style. If you'd like to learn about fuming White Oak, ask Jeff, he has the process mastered!

The next stop was at the home of Stan Wolport. Stan's shop is in the basement of his home. A large unfinished area is the machine room, with a large Powermatic lathe along with many other tools. Stan is primarily a turner, but his shop is well equipped to do many kinds of work. Besides the machine room, a basement bedroom has been converted to his hand *Continued on next page*

tool room with two cabinetmakers benches and a large collec-

tion of hand tools. This room holds his extensive book, video and magazine library, a DVD player, TV and is



even carpeted!

Throughout Stan's shop you can see his penchant for organization. Everything has it's place, and ev-

ery drawer or cabinet is labelled with its contents. You can also see the results of his many years of tool collecting, with



hundreds of planes and other tools arranged neatly around the walls.

The third shop belonged to Richard Gonzalez. His shop is a 16 x 24 addition behind his garage.

Richard had just spent a month totally gutting the shop, adding insulation, a window and a heater to a formerly unfinished space. He also added an insulated wood floor, allowing for power to be run under the floor as well. He completed the work and moved his tools back in just the day before the




tour! The entire shop is sheathed in OSB, allowing for

things to be hung wherever he needs them.

The last shop we visited belonged to Marcel Braun. His shop is a large dedicated outbuilding, approximately 1000 square feet. Marcel showed us





a large notebook that has photographs of the many projects he has build over the years. There were many custom built workstations in his shop and some innovative storage ideas such as his clamp storage rack that holds quite a few clamps in a compact area. He uses an interesting old Craftsman table saw that has a digitally controlled blade depth.

After the tour we all got together for lunch. It was a great time to get to know each other a little better, and I think everyone agreed that we had all learned a thing or two that we can use in our own shops.

Quite a few additional photographs are posted on the Guild website, check them out for many other views of these shops.

The Guild hopes to conduct further shop tours, in other areas of the front range. If you are willing to let us visit your shop, please let us know! Whether large or small, it is always great to see a fellow woodworker's work space, and since we are all woodworkers, you don't even have to clean up the sawdust!

Hands-on class – Dovetail vise

On Saturday April 23rd the guild will be having a class on building a dovetail vise. The class will be located in the basement of Rockler and will begin at 9:30 in the morning. I will be leading the class in which we will review the purpose and design and then build the vise. Additionally, after we have completed the construction we will go over the use and procedures for making hand cut dovetails with the new vise. The price of the class is going to be \$20. March Presentation

Our March presenter was Al Cummins. Al, at 94 years old, is a frequent demonstrator at Rockler and was a founding member of the Colorado Woodworkers Guild thirty years ago.

Al is an expert with the router. He believes the router is the most flexible and versatile tool in the shop. He explained about the different types of router bits, and the grades of carbide. He demonstrated how a router, mounted to a router table, can be used as a small edge jointer, by adding a thin shim (such as a metal ruler) to the outfeed fence, and aligning

the bearing of a pattern bit to this outfeed fence. He also demonstrated how to make a "5 point" box joint, by dadoes spaced the bit thickness from the fence.

Many thanks to Al for sharing his enthusiasm for the router and router table with us.



SketchUp Class for Woodworkers!

This is the class you've been waiting for. A full 6 hours of classroom hands on training in the use of SketchUp. SketchUp is a free, easy to use and powerful 3D design and modeling program by Google. SketchUp can be downloaded at SketchUp.google.com. This class will be tailored specially for us woodworkers.

The class will be held on Saturday, April 30th in a computer lab at Front Range Community College-Boulder campus in Longmont, CO. Each attendee will have the full hands-on use of a computer. The class is being taught by Steve Dapkus (who is also a woodworker) on Google's SketchUp team. The plan is to introduce you to the capabilities of SketchUp and to actually work on the design of woodworking projects.

Here is a description of what will be covered:

Morning: The basics about making shapes, manipulating them, and extruding in 3D space

Afternoon:

1) A small bench with a few important joints (dovetails and mortise/tenon).

2) A basic cabinet (basically how to make a box).

3) A shop table. One that could be tailored for specific uses, like an outfeed table or a router table. (This one may be optional due to time).

Cal Noguchi brought in a collaborative work titled "First Light". Cal built an elegant frame of

mahogany, maple and bubinga, that holds a two pane glass photograph of a landscape. A striking piece of art that will look nice wherever it finds a home.



Al Limiero brought in a bench mount dovetail vice as depicted in Joseph Moxon's classic book The Art of Joinery. Al's vice was accurate down to the two



threaded wood screws. He explained some of the interesting lessons that came from threading wood. Not all woods are suitable and you only get one chance to get it right. Made of oak, like the original probably was, this was a solid well made addition to Al's shop and no doubt will see plenty of use. Kevin Loyd brought in a mutated version of a dovetail vice

also based on the piece from Moxon's book. Suffering a lack of storage the primary goal of combining several functions vielded this odd duck. And yes I took the easy way out using threaded



rods because I was not about to undertake threading wood (a tip of the hat to Al).

Mark Klosky brought in a salad bowl that teaches a lesson. Noth-

ing says improvised artistic expression like the pass of a router set too low. A well done bowl that didn't reveal its secret.

A message about Safety

After the March Guild meeting, some members expressed concern over the issue of safety during demonstrations. This should be an area of concern for all of us. Woodworking has many potential dangers, due to sharp and high-speed powered tools. Any tool capable of cutting or shaping wood easily has the potential to cut skin or worse.

The Guild wants to ensure demonstrations at Guild events are performed safely. Towards this end, we will be making some safety related changes. Any demonstrator using power tools will be asked to demonstrate and discuss safe operations during their presentations. All members are encouraged to speak up if you see an operation that you think is being performed unsafely. At the raise of a concern, we will pause to make any necessary corrections. If you are uncomfortable with speaking out publicly, please speak to any Board member (board members wear a colored badge with our title in addition to a name badge).

We are investigating the feasabiliy of a movable shield.

Many members of the guild have substantial experience that allow them to work in a manner that may not be as safe for a less experienced woodworker. Demonstrations may use machines with some guards removed to allow a better view. Knowing that we have both experienced and novice woodworkers in attendance, we will endeavor to work as safely as possible, and discuss the safety aspects of work. In any case, however, we will stop if there is any safety issue raised, and not proceed unless it can be rectified.

We thank those that came forward with their concerns. We encourage all our members to work safely in their own shops. Generally, if it does not feel safe, it probably isn't. Take a moment to think if there is a better way to make the cut. There is usually a safe way, using the proper push stick, guard, hold down or other feature of the tool. Everyone should have a fire extinguisher and first aid kit available in your shop.

A recent news story discussed a young university student who was killed when her long hair was caught up in a lathe. This was a freak accident that was foreseeable and easily preventable with simple precautions. We do not want anyone we know to suffer such needless injuries. As Norm Abram always said "Before using any power tools let's take a moment to talk about shop safety. Be sure to read, understand, and follow all the safety rules that come with your power tools. Knowing how to use your power tools properly will greatly reduce the risk of personal injury. And remember, there is no more important rule than to wear these, safety glasses."
