Dovetail Class Turns into a Series What happens when one day isn't enough, Alex?

The Guild held its first hands-on dovetail class at Rockler on April 23. It was a success in the fact that 12 of us went home with a new dovetail vise. Additionally, it was good to see everyone working together in teams to efficiently make and assemble all the parts. In an often solitary craft the comradery



and cooperation made for a fun and productive day. Given that there were some that had to leave early and there was in general too much information for one day the class has been transformed into a more thoroughly structured four part series.

The first step was building the vise. The next step will be during the social hour at the May 17th Guild meeting. There will be a few saw vises set up and a variety of handsaws for the students to use. This will allow them to see the



difference the saw makes and help them understand better the affect the saw has in the process and on the results. There will then be two Saturday classes at Rockler. The next will be in the later half of July. This class will be focused more on the saw, the geometry



and sharpening of the teeth, setting the teeth, technical exercises for sawing and ending the afternoon with everyone having cut a simple set of dovetails.

The following class will have a more intensive focus on dovetails. With everyone having completed their vises, become more proficient with their handsaws and done some dovetailing practice this final gathering will go into the difference between the two classes of dovetails. This will involve a little discussion and a lot of cutting of dovetails. This is when we can all go through the process and work on techniques together to move our dovetails from the construction grade to possessing the knowledge necessary to make the showpiece joinery. I look forward to moving through the steps with everyone. Times and dates will be announced as soon as they are set.

April Presentation

The April presentation was given by Paul Seipel. Paul demonstrated the new Carter bandsaw jig for resawing logs up to 23" long and approximately 6 to 8 inches round. Paul feels the quality of Carter products for the band saw is excellent.

He then gave a demonstration on bandsaw boxes and went over the basic steps used to make a box. The following are the steps:

- 1. Make sure to flatten the bottom square to the back of your box.
 - 2. Cut a 1/4" thick back off the box blank.
- 3. Make a copy of the pattern and glue it to the front of the box.
- 4. Start cutting out the pattern following the arrows on the lines, if given.
 - 5. Cut out the drawers.
 - 6. Glue the back on the box.
 - 7. Cut out the outside shape of the box..
 - 8. Sand all of the box. Sand some more.
 - 9. Cut the front and back off the drawer.
 - 10. Cut out the middle of the drawer.
 - 11. Glue the front and back on the drawer.
 - 12. Sand all parts and finish the box.

Paul highly recommended the Carter blade stabilizer for cutting the bandsaw boxes. This replaces the upper guide with a single bearing with a groove to support the blade. The lower guides are removed or backed off when using the blade stabilizer. Using the stabilizer allows for much tighter turns. Paul also recommends using a 3/16" blade.

At a later date, Paul will also be demonstrating how to flock the inside of the drawers.

We were able to fill all the seats in the computer lab and everyone showed up bright eyed and ready to learn at 9A.M. Each person had their own computer and the instructor's computer screen was displayed on a large smart board at the front of the class room. There were a broad range of people who attended. From people with minimal computer experience to several who had used SketchUp to create very complex drawings. There were 5 Guild members who had experience with SketchUp who helped out with the class. Thanks to Al Limiero, Cal Noguchi, Richard Gonzalez, Chuck Hevenor, and Viki Hennon for helping. I think I can speak for all of us, whatever our experience level we all left knowing more about SketchUp than when we walked in.

Steve said he would be willing to teach another class for the Guild. The Guild will be working on setting that up later on this year. Look for an announcement in the newsletter and/or at a meeting.

Show & Tell April 2011

There were only three submissions to the Show & Tell in April, but they were very nice. Mike Seymour brought in two pieces. The first was a very nice example of scroll work. The flowing writing with the mirror reversal made for a very nice effect. At first what appeared to be a decorative piece stood out as a



name with a second look. Mike's second piece was a jewelry box with even more fine detailed scroll work. There was a bit of controversy when he said it was walnut. With some debate as to what wood it was it may be that Mike is an owner of mystery wood. I



know I have a few pieces of mystery wood that need using. There is no mystery though regarding Mike's skills with the scroll saw. Very nice work indeed.

Our second entrant and winner for the night was Chuck Hevenor with his Koa topped occasional table. Chuck explained that one of the learning experiences gained from this project was that smoothing planes and wood don't always play well together. Finding that his plane was leaving tear-out regardless of technique or approach he eventually moved to sanding the top. The base was made of tiger maple, which contrasted well with the top. He also attached the top to the base to give the illusion of the top floating above. With good lines and a nice selection of com-

plimenting woods Chuck's table will add to the room it is placed in.



Chuck had some experience assembling things made of wood, but it wasn't until after retiring around 2001 that he really went head long into woodworking. Chuck was faced with the time and desire to make some built-ins in their home, but wanted to learn more about woodworking before starting the project. At this point in time Chuck and his wife were living in New England so he had a very easy time finding a class on the subject. Like many of us a couple steps in and the woodworking bug had bitten him. Before it was over he had taken a great deal more classes (nearly 20) than he initially set out to take. But with the likes of Garret Hack and others roaming the classrooms of the New England countryside there was no shortage of inspiration or opportunity to learn. When the classes were over and they moved to Colorado they had to move the shop that included 7,000 pounds of equipment. Diving into woodworking Chuck has continued to encounter challenges and opportunities to learn, which is one of his favorite aspects. Never repeating a project and always seeking a challenge he enjoys the planning phase with its problem solving. One challenge in the last year was going from using CADD to using SketchUp. He was an assistant at the recent SketchUp class helping others become more comfortable with the software.

This opportunity for the Guild to have an advertised gallery opening has not happened before and if we make it a success then we may find more opportunities in the future.
