October Speaker

Bruce Cohen has been building furniture professionally since 1983, though he started working wood as a young child in his father's basement workshop. At the age of four he received his own toolbox. Initially, Bruce started out as a silversmith exploring the interrelationship between form and negative space where his hop fit in his car.

Initially, Bruce was building bed frames which became a specialty for his woodworking. During the ensuing years Bruce earned a degree in molecular biology and biochemistry while continuing to contend with the cold of winter in his garage, stove heated shop. He decided to pursue woodworking with employees but devoted more effort to time management than shaping wood. Presently Bruce works alone concentrating on his Flowing Wood series of furniture reflecting the influence by Art Nouveau, Sam Maloof, James Krenov, and his earlier work in gold and silver.

Lately, Bruce has been spending more time at the lathe expanding his nationally recognized abilities. Currently he divides his time between turning and building furniture, each reflecting the functionality of the wood's rough form, source, and purpose combined with his imagination and skill. In many ways his work is akin to that of a sculptor, envisioning the finished piece emerging from a rough cut of wood rather than stone.

The Woodworking Show 2011

The annual Woodworking Shows weekend will be running the Friday through Sunday of the opening weekend as the Lakewood Gallery. We will have a booth there as usual and still have time slots to fill for volunteers to represent the Guild. There will be a sign up sheet at the October Guild meeting. The time slots this year are all two hours long, but if you want to take more than one you may. The show runs from 12-6 on Friday, 10-6 on Saturday and 12-4 on Sunday. Having two representatives at all times makes 18 slots to fill. We have some volunteers but not enough at this point to cover the entire show. We also will need demonstrations, which we have a few of at this point. If you would like to do a demonstration that would be helpful as well. We also need people to bring items to display so show attendees can see first-hand the types of work our members do. These items do not have to be completed and gallery ready. As I recall last year Dennis McCaigue's unfinished mandolin body attracted quite a few eyes. If you are going to volunteer feel free to bring a piece you are working on so that you explain something to a curious and interested newcomer.

This year the incentives to volunteer (representatives and demonstrators) for the booth include free entry into the show, a free Guild logo shirt, and a chance to win a prize. The prizes include a new Forrest Woodworker II 10" table saw blade, a six-piece set of German bench chisels and some choice lumber from our friends at Austin Hardwoods.
