March Presentation

At the March monthly meeting we enjoyed a presentation by Rich Johnson on finishing techniques.



Rich started by explaining the different methods of coloring wood. These included dyes, stains, glazes and chemicals. He showed us a sample of a combination of these methods used to produce an authentic Arts and Craft finish on quarter sawn white oak. During the Arts and Craft period in the early 1900s this affect was achieved by fuming wood with ammonia. Modern products allow us to achieve the same results without the risk to our health. Rich also explained some simple old finishes such as tung oil and linseed oil. He stressed the importance of proper protection and ventilation. The rags from these applications have been known to spontaneously catch fire, so taken the warning on the can seriously.

Rich then moved on to top coats, stressing that there are many choices available depending your project. He started by passing around an example of a poorly applied top coat on a piece of cherry. He showed us how to rub out this less than perfect example to produce a very fine finish. Here is his technique to be started after the top coat has cured.

- 400 grit wet/ dry sand paper, rub not just with the grain.
- 600 grit wet/dry sandpaper.
- Liberon Steel Wool 0000, *do not use* regular 0000 steel wool as it will scratch the finish.
- Pumice Stone powder, regular grit dispensed with a salt shaker and rubbed with a sponge.
- Rotten Stone powder, dispensed with a salt shaker and rubbed with a sponge.

After which the original piece of cherry with the not so desirable finish was passed around for all to see the fantastic finish accomplished with the Rich Johnson technique.

Paxton: The Wood Source

The Frank Paxton Lumber Company (see www.paxtonwood.com) has been associated with and supported the Colorado Woodworkers Guild for many years. In fact, years ago, the Guild used to have many of their meetings in the Paxton facilities.

The Paxton Lumber Company began business in Kansas City, Missouri in 1914. They established a Denver presence in 1931 and moved to their current location in 1950. Today, besides Denver, Paxton has locations in Kansas City, Chicago, Cincinnati, and San Antonio. In 2012, Paxton was purchased by Hardwood Specialty Products, Inc. (see www.hardwoods-inc.com), a company with many distribution centers throughout western Canada and the U.S. The Paxton name will continue in the middle America region.

The Denver retail store is managed by Jack Egan. Jack, with Paxton for 37 years, is a 1974 graduate of the forestry program at Ohio State University. He began his career as a timber "cruiser," locating hardwood logs for harvest. He learned to practice "release cutting," cutting the larger trees to make room for the new growth. It didn't take long after this beginning, however, for Jack to find his new home with Paxton in Denver.

Jack explained that the Denver store supplies sheet goods, veneer, hardwood lumber, edgings and mouldings. The entire Paxton team takes pride in the fact that they are Forestry Stewardship Council (FSC) certified. Jack and his team stock over 50 species of hardwood, 15-16 of which are imports. When possible they buy plantation grown wood and their sheet goods have no added formaldehyde.

The biggest challenges that Jack and Paxton face are customer education and sometimes the supply of materials, especially as it might be effected by the national economy and international geopolitical situation (for example, getting Baltic Birch sheet goods when there is unrest in Russia). He is proud of the fact that his staff has been very stable. He explained that large parts of the Paxton-Denver business is industrial (selling to industrial shops) and also their custom moulding services, though the Denver store does extremely well with its retail lumber sales.

The most satisfying aspects of Jack's work involve supplying materials to customers who have complex, custom projects and, after the project is complete, to have the customer come back with compliments and thanks for a job well done.

Paxton Lumber has been supporting and helping the Colorado Woodworkers Guild for many years. Only this past month, Paxton provided a great price for lumber that our Community Services Committee will use for bird house kits for this summer's charitable activities, especially Kid's Spree in Aurora. The Guild appreciates the support and looks forward to continuing this mutually beneficial relation-
