April Presentation

At the March general meeting we had a great presentation on the setup and use of a bandsaw by guild member Paul Seipel. Paul started by covering the setup and maintenance of a bandsaw. We learned how to

Install a blade and keeping from falling off the top wheel of the bandsaw

while installing it on the bottom wheel by using a simple spring clamp

How to coil a blade.

How to tune a new blade; clean it with naphtha, lubricate it and round the back with a stone to facilitate cutting tight curves.

Set the bandsaw table square to the blade.

Installing new tires on the wheels was discussed but not demonstrated. Warm the tire in hot water, wipe it off and stretch it over the wheel. If there are grooves in the existing tire, it should be replaced.

Proper tension adjustment, with nothing touching the blade (no wheels or guide blocks) with little finger pressure blade should move 1/16 - 1/8 inch, no more.

Release the tension on the blade after use to avoid bending the blade.

Using a roller stabilizer (carter) allows the saw to make a very tight turn.

After demonstrating how to set up the bandsaw, Paul showed us how to cut a simple bandsaw box. Glue the pattern on to your block. Paul uses 3M 77 spray adhesive.

Cut off the back of the box, about 1/2 inch, using a resaw blade.



Cut out the box on the pattern



Cut out the drawer on the pattern.

Cut off the front and back of the drawer. About 1/2 inch each.

Now cut out a block from the drawer so the drawer block ends up "U" shaped.



Glue the drawer front and back to the "U" shaped drawer block and you have a drawer.

Glue the back on the original block. The cut out the "body" from the resulting block.



You now have a bandsaw box with a drawer. If you did not attend the meeting and want more details. The video of this presentation will be up on the guild web site sometime soon.

April's show and tell had a good variety of projects helping to represent the diverse interests of our group. The display was kicked off by Chris Woychak who brought in two keepsake boxes. Made of alder with pewter lids. He made one for his mother's birthday and the other for his date. These were made with the assistance and under the watchful eye of Doug Pinney.

Bob Brewer the prolific model maker brought in a scale copy of an M1 Abrams tank. Being made almost entirely of oak Bob spent 130 hours to make a board look like a tank.

Linden Snyder brought in a Shaker-style end table he made. He made two one was of cherry, but he opted to bring the one made of walnut. Included in the table was a drawer with hand cut half-lap dovetails.

Our fearless leader el Presidente Cary Goltermann brought in a box that he made from scrap. The box was made using hand cut dovetails and was in fact the first dovetailed box Cary has made. The purpose for the box was to hold a Sargent multi-plane and all of its various parts and pieces.

The winner of the night was Steve Shapleigh who brought in his pipe cabinet. Made of butternut and walnut the cabinet was made by hand. Steve explained his making of the cockbead on all of the drawers and the layout of the drawers. Finished with linseed oil and shellac Steve estimated 200 hours went into making the cabinet.

Thank you everyone for bringing in your projects and showing the rest of the group what you've been doing. For the rest of you remember to share with the group your projects. No project is turned away and every skill level is encouraged to enter the Show and Tell.

Bits & Pieces Tool Glossary

BAND SAW:

A large stationary power saw primarily used by most shops to cut good aluminum sheet into smaller pieces that more easily fit into the trash can after you cut on the inside of the line instead of the outside edge.

BELT SANDER:

An electric sanding tool commonly used to convert minor touch-up jobs into major refinishing jobs. *DRILL PRESS*:

A tall upright machine useful for suddenly snatching flat metal bar stock out of your hands so that it smacks you in the chest and flings your beer across the room, denting the freshly-painted project which you had carefully set in the corner where nothing could get to it.

HAMMER:

Originally employed as a weapon of war, the hammer nowadays is used as a kind of divining rod to locate the most expensive parts adjacent to the object we are trying to hit.

HACKSAW:

One of a family of cutting tools built on the Ouija board principle... It transforms human energy into a crooked, unpredictable motion, and the more you attempt to influence its course, the more dismal your future becomes.

SKIL SAW:

A portable cutting tool used to make studs too short. *TABLE SAW*:

A large stationary power tool commonly used to launch wood projectiles for testing wall integrity. *PHILLIPS SCREWDRIVER*:

Normally used to stab the vacuum seals under lids or for opening old-style paper-and-tin oil cans and splashing oil on your shirt; but can also be used, as the name implies, to strip out Phillips screw heads. STRAIGHT SCREWDRIVER:

A tool for opening paint cans. Sometimes used to convert common slotted screws into non-removable screws and butchering your palms.

PRY BAR:

A tool used to crumple the metal surrounding that clip or bracket you needed to remove in order to replace a 50 cent part.

UTILITY KNIFE:

Used to open and slice through the contents of cardboard cartons delivered to your front door; works particularly well on contents such as seats, vinyl records, liquids in plastic bottles, collector magazines, refund checks, and rubber or plastic parts.

Especially useful for slicing work clothes, but only while in use.

HOSE CUTTER:

A tool used to make hoses too short.

TWO-TON ENGINE HOIST:

A tool for testing the maximum tensile strength of everything you forgot to disconnect.

HYDRAULIC FLOOR JACK:

Used for lowering an automobile to the ground after you have installed your new brake shoes, trapping the jack handle firmly under the bumper.

VISE-GRIPS:

Generally used after pliers to completely round off bolt heads. If nothing else is available, they can also be used to transfer intense welding heat to the palm of your hand.

OXYACETYLENE TORCH:

Used almost entirely for lighting various flammable objects in your shop on fire. Also handy for igniting the grease inside the wheel hub out of which you want to remove a bearing race. It's best use is for igniting new seat covers.

PLIERS:

Used to round off bolt heads. Sometimes used in the creation of blood-blisters

WIRE WHEEL:

Cleans paint off bolts and then throws them somewhere under the workbench with the speed of light. Also removes fingerprints and hard-earned calluses from fingers in about the time it takes you to say, 'Oh damn'

SON OF A BITCH TOOL:

Any handy tool that you grab and throw across the garage while yelling 'Son of a bitch' at the top of your lungs. It is also, most often, the next tool that you will need, and at times must be retrieved from across the road.
