Dick's presentation included bow making history, single piece bows, multiple piece bows, laminating and joinery techniques, form making, adhesives, finishing and much more.

And Dick's credentials don't stop at expertise in themaking of bows, he is also highly proficient at their use in both target archery and hunting. He has taken all sorts of big game including deer, elk, bear, and many other species.

Show & Tell

The May show and tell displayed six member's handiwork all different from the next.

First up was Ed Lippert who brought in a collection of tools in a working display case he made. Ed's motivation was not to display his display case, but rather his collection of antique doweling tools. Doweling tools are not so common as hand planes, saws and the like, which was why he thought it would be a nice curiosity to include in the lineup.

Next was El Capitan, Cary Goltermann, with a large chisel and a "restomod" hand plane. The chisel was a nearly two inch wide framing chisel. When he rescued it from the well of forgotten tools it had no handle, the socket had been severely mushroomed, and the cutting edge appeared to have been used by a stone carver. He managed to return the chisel back to a usable state with a double hooped handle and all. Cary also brought in a "restomod" hand plane that was quietly waiting at Charlie's Second Hand Tool. It was a Liberty Bell edition Stanley that he resoled with padauk and rehandled with walnut. He also had to make a replacement screw cap to secure the blade. All of this effort led to a very good lesson, which was the Liberty Bell blade mechanism doesn't work very well. Maybe this will work best for coarse work.

Cliff Farris brought in a multi-tool that he made. 'Twas Cliff's first attempts at carving and turquoise inlay. Cliff said that the two best purposes for his multi-tool at this time are as a walking cane and a coyote beater.

Curt Vogt the unsleeping turner of things was not present at the meeting, but his work was. Curt brought in a Christmas ornament made of curly maple and padauk. This was actually a "Thank you" gift for the piece of padauk he had been given. Linden Snyder brought in a bulldozer that he had made of cherry. He had gone through a stack of old plans and found this dozer that fit the bill. The material used was in a previous life referred to as one-inch stair treads. At this point I would venture a guess the wood is happier as a grandchild's toy than a stair tread.

The winner of the night was Scott Roth with his school homework. Scott's homework can more accurately be described as a marquetry picture of hawk poised on a branch. Scott was wrapping up his second class on marquetry at Red Rocks and this was the semester-end culmination of his work.
