
Remember, not much is free these days, so seize the opportunity. See you at the party!

Programs

November

At the November Guild Meeting we had two minidemos.

Our PR Chair, Lindy Baer offered a short presentation on wood dust and, especially, wood toxicity. Though the dust alone, especially in the 10 micron or smaller size, is a problem for the respiratory system and perhaps the eyes, the greater problems come when the wood is an irritant, sensitizer or just simply poisonous.

Lindy defined these terms and then provided some data tables with examples of several woods and how they stack up. He then circulated an example of a Material Safety Data Sheet (MSDS) for wood dust exposure and supplied a list of the precautions woodworkers should take to protect themselves from the more severe problems.

Next Kevin gave us a great presentation on Wood Bodied Planes. Kevin explained to us what to look for in a wood plane and what to avoid. He then demonstrated how to setup and adjust a wood plane. He also showed us how to put an edge on a cabinet scraper. Finally he used wood planes and scrapers to show how he made a table leg which was convex on one side and concave on the other.

January

The January Program with Stan Wolpert and Doug Pinney. I asked Stan for a synopsis of the presentation. Here is what he wrote"

Why Hand Tools are important in a Furniture Makers Shop

If you do not start out at the beginning of your woodworking hobby learning hand skills and instead rely on machinery you'll only ever be a beginner. You end up designing and making things that your machines are really good at.

If you know how to use a hand plane, a hand saw and chisel properly you can join a piece of wood at any angle and any shape. Hand skills take practice to become really proficient.

In the first of three presentations the January meeting will focus on the use of Hand Planes and what every woodworker should have in their shop. We will also discuss the importance of learning how to sharpen these basic tools.

Show And Tell

We had many awesome entries in the November Show N' Tell. Ending up with a tie for first place. There were six entries including a somewhat unconventional entry which we'll get to in a bit.

- 1. **Jim Ruby**: A Redwood Burl Bowl on an Antler stand.
- 2. **Dick Dailey**: laser cut Doll and Childs chairs. Here is the info which Dick provided a 1/2 scale tab-n-slot chair made out of 3/8 Baltic birch and two 1/4 scale chairs made from cardboard. These chairs were cut using a laser, then cleaned up using sanders and routers with a round-over bit. A full size model, made of 3/4 material is suitable for an adult. The 1/2 scale model is suitable for a small child. The 1/4 scale model, which could be made from 3/16 hardboard, is suitable for a doll.
- 3. **Jim Barry**: About 15 years ago I bought 2 big claro walnut slabs and promised that I'd touch them only when I had gained enough experience to build a project worthy of such beautiful wood. Here is the result from the first one. The design is inspired by a table built by Mark of The Craftsman's Path (http:// thecraftsmanspath.com/2007/10/24/asian-artsand-crafts-inspired-table/). The legs are made from cherry with 2 walnut spans on which the top lays. Mortise and tenon joints hold the frame together, and the lower stretcher is joined using a hidden sliding dovetail joint to give mechanical strength. The 2 walnut top support spans are notched and locked into dados cut in the tops of the legs. The table top is about 19 inches wide and 60 inches long. It's hard to show in a picture how much intricate grain is captured in this beautiful board – all credit to the Creator! To bring out this figure I used a finish using many coats of a home-made wiping varnish (spar varnish with paint thinner) a la Bob Flexner.
- 4. **Ted Smathers**: The Arts and Crafts side chair was featured in March/April 2007 Fine Woodworking article. It features a curved back and angled side rails and tapered and angled back legs resulting in pyramid ends. The chair *Continued on next page*















has the exact dimensions as the FWW article, but the fixturing for the joinery was changed more to my liking. The wood is quarter sawn white oak and the seat is upholstered leather. The finish is 1) light brown dye stain 2) shellac sealer 3) antique walnut gel stain and 4) oil/ urethane topcoats. This is very close to the Stickley Onondaga color which I was trying to match. The chair is one of four and it goes with an Arts and Crafts table and bench of my design and build.

- 5. **Paul Seipel**: An Intarsia sculpture in Ash, Walnut, Lignum Vitae (Ironwood), Zebra Wood, Holly, Bloodwood and two red beads.
- 6. **Damon Hauschultz**: It is a wedding altar that I made six years ago for my own wedding. It must have worked because we are still married! I purchased the stand from Hobby Lobby which is probably some kind of woodworker's blasphemy. In my defense, I did put a peg into the top to stabilize the rock. The rock on the other hand, I found in a gravel pit in central Colorado. It is a metamorphic rock from the basement of the Colorado Rockies. It is similar to a granite in hardness. Technically the rock is a metasedimentary migmatite gneiss, 1.75 billion years old. It took about 9 hours to polish using a wet angle grinder polisher. Grit sizes used in sequence were: 30, 60, 100, 220, 400, 800, 1800, 3000, 8000, 13000. Takes about an hour per grit size. Makes me appreciate how a good varnish over wood can bypass the 400 - 13000 grit sizes in a single step!

NOTE: Damon's entry used a wood of type *rock*. It's still a great entry! I love seeing any work from a guild member, regardless of the material used.

We had two winners; Number 3 Jim Barry and Number 4 Ted Smathers.

About Wood

Here is a new column about specific woods that will appear from time to time. The column will present a variety of the characteristics of the selected wood, including but not limited to Modulus of Elasticity (MOE), Modulus of Rupture (MOR), Janka Hardness, Specific Gravity, Crush Strength, Workability, Appearance, Toxicity, Sustainability, Uses, and cost range (when available). Aspen

There are several species of aspen, the most common in our area being Quaking Aspen. The scientific name is populous tremuloides. Aspen is a hardwood by classification and is closely related to popular and cottonwood. Aspen is found in North America and does see some commercial harvest.

Here is a summary of the characteristics of Aspen:

Distribution: Canada and northern United States Tree Size (largest): 65-100 ft tall; 3-6 ft diameter

Average Dried Weight: 26 pounds/cu ft

Specific Gravity (Basic, 12% moisture content): 0.35; 0.42

Modulus of Rupture: 8,400 lb force/sq in Modulus of Elasticity: 1,180,000 lb force/sq in

Crush Strength: 4,250 lb force/sq in

Janka Hardness: 350 (one of the softest of the hardwoods)

Shrinkage: Radial, 3.5%; Tangential, 6.7%; Volumetric, 11.5%; T/R Ratio, 1.9

Heartwood Appearance: Greenish to light brown Sapwood Appearance: pale yellow to nearly white

Texture: Straight grain, medium texture

Stability: High

Relative Strength: low (14-18.9)

Decay Resistance: Low; non-durable; susceptible to insect attack

Workability: easy with hand and machine tools; poor jail-holding; glues and finishes well

Odor: no characteristic odor

Toxicity: Yes Potency: Low

Toxicity Source: Wood, Dust

Reaction: dermatitis, sneezing, asthma Sustainability: Not listed as threatened

Uses: Boxes/crates; veneer, plywood, turnings, furniture (limited)

Sponsor Profile <u>Collector's Specialty Woods</u>

This month we feature a profile of Collector's Specialty Woods, a family owned, Colorado company and one of our sponsors. Collector's Specialty Woods first began more than 60 years ago when Stuart Mace began collecting and working with beautiful woods. In those early years, Stuart was supplying the Toklat Gallery in Aspen with Gallery gifts and producing custom furniture.

In 1978, Stuart's son, Kent, opened a woodshop in Gardner, Colorado (west of Walsenburg), continued the collecting of fine woods, and began producing high-end furniture. Their furniture business served customers with custom designs country-wide. They operated this business relying on word-of-mouth for their advertising and networking.

In 2002, the family moved into the lumber sales space and in 2012 they established a showroom and warehouse facility in Denver. They still maintain their Gardner facility for their woodshop, kiln drying, and most of their milling. Collector's Specialty Woods is primarily focused on the woods of North America and especially reclaimed woods and woods from sustainable forestry, but they have many species in their collection. For most of the species, they can provide slabs, flitches, lumber in a variety of sizes, including custom preparation.

They are especially proud of their kiln drying operation in Gardner. One of their objectives is to provide woods that are suitable for the dry climate in the Rocky Mountains. Their kiln helps to achieve that objective.
