After a prolonged cold spell, it's finally getting warm enough that I can spend some time in my shop (it's a detached garage). I'm currently finishing up a new

router table "wing" for my table saw. The top is made from a scrap of Corian which is very smooth. I'm looking forward to getting it done and using it. I'm also working on restoring an old "Fulton" cast iron plane. This is pretty unusual in that the frog is integral with the body of the plane. When I got it, it was missing the parts which adjust the depth of cut. I adapted the threaded rod and the depth of cut adjusting wheel (brass adjusting knob) from a broken Stanley (which I got from Charlie's 2nd hand tools for very little). Now, I've got to make the depth of cut adjusting lever (this is the part which engages the plane blade from the adjusting wheel). I'll be attempting to make that from a piece of 3/16 inch thick tool steel.



About Wood

For March our subject is **Red Alder** (Alnus rubra). Alder
(Alnus spp.) consists of several
species growing in Asia, North
America and Europs. **Red Alder**,
an important hardwood for
woodworkers is harvested from
the Pacific Northwest, where it




is the most abundant commercial hardwood. As we have done in previous columns, before getting to the details about Alder, we will spend a few words define another technical term used in the lumber business; in this case the Modulus of Rupture or MOR.

MOR, "also referred to as bending strength, is a measure of a specimen's strength before rupture. It can be used to determine a wood species' overall strength; unlike the modulus of elasticity, which measures the wood's deflection, but not its ultimate strength. (That is to say, some species of wood will bow under stress, but not easily break.)

MOR is expressed in pounds-force per square inch (lbf/in2) or megapascals (MPa). This number is given for wood that has been dried to a 12% moisture content, unless otherwise noted.

In practical terms, the number itself isn't all that meaningful, but it becomes useful to use in comparison with other woods. For instance, Hickory is known to have excellent strength properties among domestic species in the US, and has a MOR of 20,200 lbf/in2 (139.3 MPa). In comparison Red Oak is another well known wood used in cabinetry and furniture, and has a MOR of 14,300 lbf/in2 (98.6 MPa)." (From Eric Meier's The Wood Database)




Red Alder

Red Alder is the principal species available in North America and is harvested mostly from the North West. It survives best in areas where there is plenty of moisture. Like Aspen, it does well in burned over lands and in areas that have been ravaged by earthquakes or logging.

Here is a summary of the characteristics of **Red Alder**.

- Distribution: Coastal western North America
- Tree Size: height of 90-130 ft. (25-40 m) tall, 2-3 ft. (.6-1.0 m) trunk diameter
- Average Dried Weight: 28 lbs/ft3 (450 kg/m3)
- Specific Gravity: (Basic, 12% MC); .37, .45
- Modulus of Rupture (MOR): 9,800 lbf/in2 (67.6 MPa)
- Modulus of Elasticity (MOE): 1,380,000 lbf/in2 (9.52 GPa)
- Crush Strength: 5,820 lbf/in2 (40.1 MPa)
- Janka Hardness: 590 lbf (2,620 N)
- Shrinkage: Radial, 4.4%; Tangential, 7.3%; Volumetric, 12.6%; T/R Ratio, 1.7
- Heartwood Appearance: No visible distinction between heartwood and sapwood.
- Sapwood Appearance: light tan to reddish brown; darkens and reddens with age
- Grain/Texture: similar to Birch; generally straight with moderately fine, uniform texture
- Stability: High
- Relative Strength: Very Low, <14
- Decay Resistance: Low
- Workability: works, bends, glues and finishes very well; turns well
- Odor: no characteristic odor
- Toxicity: irritant
- Potency: moderate
- Toxicity Source: dust
- Reaction: eye, skin and respiratory
- Sustainability: not listed as threatened
- Uses: furniture, cabinets, doors, shutters, mouldings, panel stock, turnings, carvings
- Typical Cost: \$3-6 / bd ft
