218 Paid through December 31, 2015


106 Expired on December 31, 2014

#### Sponsor Profile Daiku Custom Woodcraft and EZ Dado

EZ Dado is a company and product owned by Cal Noguchi, a member of our Guild. Before joining the Guild, Cal worked in software development for AT&T Bell Labs in the Denver metro area. Not long after joining the Guild, Cal decided he needed to help out and ran for office. In the early 2000s, Cal served as Guild secretary, treasurer, and vice president. Even now, he continues to serve as our audiovisual chair.

In 2006, Cal formed his Daiku Custom Woodcrafts. With Daiku, Cal has completed many and varied commissions, especially for cabinetry, shoji (Japanese screens), and display cases.

From 2011 through 2013, in *Fine Woodworking*, he learned of the "speed tenon" techniques of Christian Becksvoort. These concepts led Cal to thoughts about making a jig for doing dadoes. After three generations of jigs, Cal has a product, EZ Dado that allows a woodworker to cut dadoes on her /his table saw without changing to a dado blade set. What is especially unique about his jig is how he "registers" the thickness of the piece to fit into the resultant dado. Cal sells the jig plans as well as multiple versions of the completed jig. Like most of our other sponsors, EZ Dado offers a 10% discount to Guild members.

Cal has a patent pending for the EZ Dado product. He reports that the greatest challenges for such an effort are in getting the word out about the product. The Guild is appreciative of Cal's support and wish him continued success.



#### About Wood White Oak

White Oak (Quercus alba) is our focus for April. White Oak consists of several species growing especially in eastern North America. The White Oak tree is the state tree for Connecticut, Illinois, and Maryland. White Oak represents approximately 15 percent of the total U.S. commercial hardwoods.

Before we get to the details about White Oak, it is time to define yet another technical term used in the lumber industry, that of "**crushing strength**."

Crushing strength is a measurement of the wood's maximum crushing strength when the force is applied to the ends of the wood (compression is parallel to the grain). This number is a good indicator of the wood's strength in applications such as deck posts, chair legs, or other circumstances where the load being applied is parallel rather than perpendicular to the grain.


In practical terms, the number itself isn't all that meaningful, but it becomes useful to use in comparison with other woods. For instance, Ipe is known to have excellent strength properties among imported species, and has a crushing strength of 13,510 lbf/in2 (93.1 MPa). In comparison White Oak is a well-known wood used in cabinetry and furniture, and has a crushing strength of 7,440 lbf/in2 (51.3 MPa), and Redwood is commonly used for decking, and has a crushing strength of 5,690 lbf/in2 (39.2 MPa).

White Oak is the most common of eight to twelve Quercus alba species. They are harvested mostly from the Eastern United States. These trees thrive in rich, well-drained soil. Here is a summary of the characteristics of **White Oak**:

(1 -1.2 m) trunk diameter Average Dried Weight: 47 lbs/ft3 (755 kg/m3) Specific Gravity: (Basic, 12% MC); .60, .75 Modulus of Rupture (MOR): 14,830 lbf/in2 (102.3 MPa) Modulus of Elasticity (MOE): 1,762,000 lbf/in2 (12.15 GPa) Crush Strength: 7,370 lbf/in2 (50.8 MPa) Janka Hardness: 1,350 lbf (5,990 N) Shrinkage: Radial, 5.6%; Tangential, 10.5%; Volumetric, 16.3%; T/R Ratio, 1.9 Heartwood Appearance: light to medium brown, commonly with olive cast Sapwood Appearance: white to light brown Grain/Texture: straight; coarse, uneven texture Stability: medium Relative Strength: Fairly high, 23-26.9 Decay Resistance: High Workability: good results with hand and machine tools; glues, stains and finishes well Odor: tell-tale smell common to most oaks Toxicity: sensitizer Potency: weak Toxicity Source: leaves, bark, and dust Reaction: eve, skin and respiratory Sustainability: not listed as threatened Uses: furniture, cabinets, interior trim, flooring, panel stock, boats, barrels Typical Cost: \$4-9 / bd ft.
