

April Show & Tell

April's show and tell had a good selection of techniques displayed ranging from boxes, bowls, and even the heretical CNC machine.

The first was a plaque **Doug Pinney** made out of alder with a CNC machine (ok they are not heretical). This was an idea that apparently Doug had been knocking around for a while and he finally cleared enough time on his schedule to let the CNC execute his idea. Made from planks of alder the picture is of a barrel head with a glass of wine and grapes perfect for hanging in the wine cellar at the Pinney estate.

Next up was **Bill Knoll's** nut bowl made from Russian olive with decorative inlay. Bill turned the bowl and finding considerable cracking coming radially from the pith he followed cardinal rule #31 "If you can't hide it accentuate it". Bill used turquoise colored "Inlace" from our friends at Woodcraft to fill the heavy cracks. He then finished the turning with General Finishes bowl finish and buffed with steel wool. The two-tone color combination really worked well and makes for a nice piece to go on a side table.

Jim Record brought in his discovery of cotton-woods secret figure. Jim was messing about with some cottonwood and decided to make a bowl. He arrived at a satisfactory shape for the bowl and then reached for the Mahoney's Oil for the finish. The lump of dull light-colored wood with the addition of the oil burst before his eyes to reveal the intense figure that ran through the bowl. As a user of cotton-wood I can attest to the blandest looking pieces coming alive with a bit of finish.

The winner of the night was **Jim McNamee** who brought in his first attempt at making a keepsake box. This one is slated as a gift for his granddaughter to celebrate her graduation. The piece was made of hard maple and walnut and lifting the lid revealed a walnut drop-in tray. Jim went to the effort of making the tray fit the box well enough that the tray had a piston action and would gently lower itself into the box. The finish was that of shellac but he reckons there were eight to 12 applications. Jim thanked Stan Wolpert for the knowledge he gained in Stan's finishing class helping to make the project a success.

Thanks to all who brought their projects in and shared their experience with the rest of the group. The show and tell is open to everyone all you need to do is show up with something cool you made or want to show us and tell us about.



About Wood

This month we consider the wood **Sassafras**. The genus sassafras consists of three species of deciduous trees (and one that is now extinct) from the family Lauraceae native to eastern North America and eastern Asia. The most common species that we are likely to see is **Sassafras albidum**. Blackheart Sassafras is an unrelated species from Australia. Together, aspen, basswood, cottonwood, elm, gum, hackberry, sassafras, sycamore and willow represent 12.5 percent of commercially available U.S. hardwoods.

Recall that in previous columns, we have defined the Modulus of Rupture (MOR), the Modulus of Elasticity (MOE), Crush Strength, and Janka Hardness. We will continue to use those terms. Most of the other terms are generally well understood and will not be defined further. If you have questions about other terms or questions about a specific wood, contact

Sassafras

Sassafras albidum (common name **sassafras**) is the main species available in North America and is harvested from the eastern United States.





Here is a summary of the characteristics of **Sassa-fras**:

Distribution: Eastern North America from New England to Florida and west to the plains Tree size: 50-65 ft (15-20 m) tall; 2-3 ft (.6-1.0 m) trunk diameter

Average Dried Weight: 31 lbs/ft3 (495 kg/m3) Specific Gravity: (Basic, 12% MC): .42, .50 Modulus of Rupture (MOR): 9,000 lbf/in2 (62.1 MPa)

Modulus of Elasticity (MOE): 1,120,000 lbf/in2 (7.72 GPa)

Crush Strength: 6,600 lbf/in2 (45.5 MPa)

Janka Hardness: 630 lbf (2,800 N)

Shrinkage: Radial, 4.0%; Tangential, 6.2%; Volu-

metric, 10.3%; T/R Ratio, 1.6

Heartwood Appearance: medium to light brown,

sometimes with an orange or olive hue

Sapwood Appearance: paler yellowish brown; over-

all a strong resemblance to ash

Grain/Texture: straight grain with coarse uneven

texture

Stability: good

Relative strength: fairly low, 14.18.9

Decay Resistance: High

Workability: easy to work with; glues, stains, and

finishes well

Odor: distinct, spicy scent while being worked; con-

sidered an aromatic Toxicity: a sensitizer Potency: weak

Toxicity Source: leaves, sap, bark, wood, dust

Reaction: nausea and respiratory effects

Sustainability: not listed as threatened, however

limited availability

Uses: boat building, furniture, millwork, mouldings,

windows, doors and cabinets Typical Cost: \$3-6/bd ft
