## **Presidents Message**

There are some exciting things happening. We have two new Classified Ad pages on the guilds web. The first has been up for a while, For Sale By Members. The second is For Sale By Guild.

Any current member can advertise tools for sale on the For Sale By Members page. There are instructions on the home page for this. This page is visible to members and non-members. All memberships expire on December 31 of the current year. Starting in November we will begin to issue member cards for the 2016 calendar year. New members joining after November 1<sup>st</sup> will receive a membership card good through 2016-12-31. Existing members can start to renew in November.

## July Presentation Zen and the Art of Finish Restoration

Not many people get to do what they love and make a living at it. Randall Marder is one of those lucky few. Marder kindled an interest in wood finishes as he searched for a concoction that would protect outdoor furniture from West Coast beach weather. After many failures, he chose a mixture of solvent, oils and varnish. Over the years, Marder has refined that mix to give what he believes is the "secret sauce" used by carpenters who built the arts and crafts-style homes and furniture designed by Greene & Greene. He researched wood finishing methods used 'round the world to give him insights into what the finest craftsmen of a century ago would have done. Then, using materials available today, he blended ingredients together to come exquisitely close to what they used.

Now here's where Zen comes in. Before beginning a restoration, Marder goes into a building and lets the interior talk to him. What care did craftsmen use in preparing trim or moldings? How has existing wood aged in this environment? What can be done to let a piece's patina delicately show through the refinished surface? "Smell, look, touch, feel the house, understand the era, the designer, environment, and use. The answers are always right in front of me," he says. Once the home has spoken, only then is it time to begin.

Using this time-tested approach with his secret Charles & Henry Greene mixture, Marder has been able to repair worn and damaged finishes in some of the most famous homes and show pieces. His ability to match existing finishes and create entirely new finished surfaces has won him wide acclaim in this specialized restoration community.

Randall brought a jar of his homemade Greene & Greene finish to our meeting to show us how he applies and works in a finish. Starting with any kind of wood he places a generous amount on the surface and massages it into the pores and grain. The next step is perhaps the most important: Marder rubs the finish into the surface using the friction and pressure generated by the side of his fist. Rubbing continues until the wood surface is noticeable warm and it feels smooth to the touch. He invited Club member to experience this method as part of his presentation. Tight grained, hard woods may require only a few repetitions of this treatment while soft woods may need more than twice as many coats.

Marder generously answered many questions during and after his presentation. Although he wouldn't share the exact recipe for his secret sauce, the information he imparted to Club members was enough to inspire us to experiment with our own formulations that best suit the needs of the kind of finishing we do. If there's enough interest, the Club may convince Randall to offer one more class for up to a dozen of us so we can study under this refinishing Zen master

## About Wood

For this month of August 2015, we consider **Catalpa**. The most common Catalpa is northern catalpa with the scientific name **catalpa speciosa**. The original distribution of northern catalpa was in a restricted region along portions of the Ohio and Mississippi rivers from Louisville to Memphis. However, the tree has been naturalized throughout much of temperate North America, especially as an ornamental in landscaping because of its flowers. There are eleven species worldwide with two in North America (northern and southern). Catalpa is thought by many to be an underrated hardwood.

Recall that in previous columns, we have defined the Modulus of Rupture (MOR), the Modulus of Elasticity (MOE), Crush Strength, and Janka Hardness. We will continue to use those terms. Most of the other terms are generally well understood and will not be defined further. If you have questions about other terms or questions about a specific wood, contact

#### Catalpa

Catalpa species is the main species available in North America and is harvested irregularly throughout its range. Other names include **indian bean** and **cigar tree** (because of the seed pods).



Here is a summary of the characteristics of Catalpa:

Distribution: Especially Eastern North America, including the more temperate parts of Canada *Tree size:* 50-100 ft. (15-30 m) tall; 2-4 ft. (0.6-1.2 m) trunk diameter Average Dried Weight: 29 lbs/ft3 (460 kg/m3) Specific Gravity: (Basic, 12% MC): .38, .46 Modulus of Rupture (MOR): 9,400 lbf/in2 (64.8 MPa) Modulus of Elasticity (MOE): 1,210,000 lbf/in2 (8.35 GPa) Crush Strength: 2,740 lbf/in2 (18.9 MPa) Janka Hardness: 550 lbf (2,450 N) Shrinkage: Radial, 2.5%; Tangential, 4.9%; Volumetric, 7.3%; T/R Ratio, 2.0 *Heartwood Appearance:* neutral gravish tan to rich golden brown; mostly heartwood Sapwood Appearance: only narrow band of pale grav: resembles ash Grain/Texture: straight with open, coarse texture Stability: excellent; seal end grain well when seasoning to avoid checking Relative strength: low; soft, weak and brittle Decay Resistance: Very good, including when in contact with soil Workability: easy to work with; soft and light; good for carving and turning; glues, stains, and finishes well; care must be taken when sanding because the early wood will disintegrate; may require pore filling for smooth finish Odor: less than pleasant creosote-like odor Toxicity: can be a skin irritant Potency: low *Toxicity Source:* dust *Reaction:* skin and some respiratory Sustainability: available on irregular basis; not threatened Uses: fence posts and rails; limited for carving, turning, and cabinetry Typical Cost: low to moderate price

## Sponsor's Corner Sponsor Profile: Austin Hardwoods

In the 80s, Austin Hardwoods of Denver used to be one of five franchises. Now there are two standalone Austin Hardwoods firms, ours here in Denver and one in Santa Ana, California. Randy Hass, Austin Hardwoods of Denver Manager, has been with the business for 14 years. Austin has 50 employees and stocks approximately 100 species of lumber. In addition to the lumber, they also offer an extensive list of sheet goods and mouldings. Most of the sheet goods come from the Pacific Northwest or Russia (for the birch).

In fact, mouldings is how they got their start. To this day, they have a large assortment of moulding knives, which they sharpen on site. They often do runs of custom mouldings. In addition to the lumber, sheet goods, and mouldings, they also offer table tops, stair treads, and railings.

Randy said that the greatest challenges are working with the customer expectations and also customer education. These are especially difficult areas since the wood products change from month to month and year to year. Other challenges that Austin Hardwoods faces is the worldwide nature of the hardwood market making the procurement of some woods difficult and the decline in the pool of highly skilled craftsmen (which, of course, Austin relies upon to buy and use their products).

Austin Hardwoods, located at 975 W. Mississippi Avenue in Denver, has been in its present location for 12 years. Members of the Guild have toured Austin in years past. Perhaps we will schedule a repeat tour soon. The Guild thanks Randy Hass and Austin Hardwoods for their continuing support.
