

Veteran's Burial Urns



At this writing the guild has 263 members paid through the end of 2015. Our member database includes 89 members whose membership expired on or before December 31 2014.

All memberships expire on December 31 of the current year. Starting in November we will begin to issue member cards for the 2016 calendar year. New members joining after November 1st will receive a membership card good through 2016-12-31. Existing members can start to renew in November.

We make member cards like this for a few reasons. First, the tape is printed on a Brother Label printer. The information is derived directly from membership applications. This saves me the need of entering everything manually. Second, it allows our sponsors to easily identify an up-to-date member card. More than a few sponsors have asked for this. Third, our members can easily know if their membership is up-to-date or not.

August Presentation

CWG member **Bill Fox** gave a presentation about how he built an 18-piece set of Green & Green (G&G) dining



room chairs. Bill entered one of his six arm chairs in July's Show & Tell and received First Place for his craftsmanship. He generously agreed to return this month and explain how he recreated these masterpieces.

Before undertaking this project Bill thoroughly researched the style, proportions, and details of G&G furniture. Unable to take measurements of an original chair (it resides in a Los Angeles museum) he purchased a Gustav Stickley reproduction of the chair. He took precise measurements of the dimensions and angles of each part of the Stickley reproduction. Bill further supplemented these measurements with the writings of Darrell Peart about G&G furniture for such details as their ebony plugs, cloud lifts, leg indents and brackets. Bill's goal was to create chairs that were more than merely copies of G&G or Stickley. He was inspired by them but wanted to express his own creative ideas and make them his own. Armed with this information. Bill prepared full size drawings and cut templates to guide construction.

Crafted from sapele wood with ebony accents, each chair represents hundreds of hours of Bill's painstaking labor. Even though a chair might have two dozen components, making 18 identical versions of each one was made faster and more repeatable by using power tools, templates, jigs and fixtures. Although he didn't mention it, Bill spent a considerable amount of time preparing and tweaking each jig until it performed perfectly. Bill brought samples of these construction aids to show what was involved in constructing and using them. He shared bits of wisdom he gained from this experience, "Carefully label all your patterns and jigs". Another piece of advice was, "Quarter-sawn sapele is susceptible to router tear out. Gradually sneak up on those cuts ". Bill emphasized, "Nothing is perfect. Aim for perfection but work with what you get."

Some hallmarks of G&G chairs are their compound curving crest rail and decorative splat. Bill went in to great detail demonstrating how he laid out, routed and fitted these highly visible parts. He showed how he made tiny tulip flower decorations for the splats with the help of a miniature belt sander and a delicate touch. Although most chair joints are either mortise-and-tenon or slip tenons, Bill used a few carefully hidden screws to solve a couple of tricky joinery problems. Chair seats are nicely upholstered in leather that complements the chairs ebony adornments.

Bill undertook a labor of love. He spent five years completing six dining room arm chairs and 12 side chairs. Members thanked Bill for sharing his wisdom and experience with us. We had many questions for him afterwards. Needless to say, everyone was anxious to admire his chair close up and inspect the many jigs he brought.

About Wood

As this column has developed, it has been about the woods that we use in our work. The list of woods is long; only a few have been addressed—the column will continue with the list, but with this month, we are taking a break to investigate some additional lumber terminology.

Along the way, several terms have been introduced so that we can better understand the physical characteristics of the various woods. Terms like Modulus of Rupture (MOR), Modulus of Elasticity (MOE), Crush Strength, and Janka Hardness have been presented. Dried Weight, Specific Gravity, Shrinkage, Stability, Decay Resistance, Toxicity, and others have also been used.

More Terminology

There are more new terms than can be covered in one issue of this column. Several of these important terms are covered this month, with more to follow in future editions. Terms are those used mainly in North America (terms are in no particular order):

Lumber (American English term): wood processed (by a saw mill) into beams and planks

Timber (Australian, British, and New Zealand): wood processed into beams and planks

Softwoods: primarily from coniferous species such as pine, fir, spruce, cedar, and hemlock; usually provided as dimensional lumber and primarily used in construction

Hardwoods: primarily from deciduous trees; usually sold as random widths and lengths of a specified thickness; commonly sold using the "quarter" system (4/4, four quarter refers to a 1-inch -thick board)

Rough-sawn (Rgh): right from the saw mill, without finished surfaces; meets "quarter" specifications (4/4 is in fact one inch)

Surfaced: has been milled to a finished surface on one or more sides; **S1S** is surfaced on one face; **S2S** is surfaced on two faces; **S3S** lumber has been surfaced on two faces and then ripped on one edge; **S4S** has been surfaced on both faces and ripped on both edges; an S3S board will be milled to approximately 3/4" thickness

Plain sawn: looking at the end-grain, the annual rings are roughly parallel to the faces; least stable

Quarter sawn: again, looking at the end-grain, the annual rings are perpendicular to the faces; most stable

Rift sawn: annual rings are half way between perpendicular and parallel to the faces

Boxed Heart: all of the heart (pith) is within the width of the board

Heart Center: the heart (pith) in the center of the cross section of the log

Free of Heart Center (FOHC): a board without any of the heart center

Free of Knots (FOK): a board without any knots

Board Foot (BdFt or **Bf)**: The most common lumber measure in the sale of hardwoods; BdFt is calculated as Length x Width x Thickness/ 144 = Bf; as examples, a block (that you might use in turning) 12" x12" x12" would be 12 Bf; a 4/4 board 6" wide and 8' long (96") would yield 4 Bf

Lumber Grades: grades set by the National Hardwood Lumber Association;

FAS, first and second grade;

Select is below FAS but higher than Common;

#1 and #2 Common, fair amount of allowable defects and color variations
