August Meeting Presentation

Dennis Scheel Put Coopering on Your Bucket List



Dennis Scheel, a member of the Rocky Mountain Tool Collectors, is a cooper. He uses coopering skills to make water buckets, about which he is quite passionate. He also makes the occasional cask, barrel, tub, and butter churn. Dennis took us through the steps of making a water-tight wooden bucket.

Wooden vessels share three common features. Their walls are fashioned from straight or curved wooden staves. They have one or two flat ends called "heads." Metal or wood hoops compress the staves and hold the vessel's heads in place.

Wooden vessel manufacture reached a peak in the mid-1800s. Since then, wooden vessels have been gradually replaced by containers made of metal, plastic, or glass. One of the last bastions of wooden barrels are the wine and distilled spirits industries. Oak wine and whiskey barrels are still used to age these liquids because they impart characteristic color, flavors, and aromas to their contents.

Dennis demonstrated how woodworkers of the 19th century made a wooden bucket. The first step is to choose the wood. Dennis prefers cedar fence posts because they are inexpensive, readily available, and can be easily split with a froe to yield straight-grained pieces. Straight-grained wood is strong, attractive, and easy to work. Scheel shapes the faces of each bucket stave with curved draw knives to give them a profile matching the desired diameter. He planes the edges of each stave to make them narrow at the opening of the bucket and wider at the bottom. As he tapers them, he bevels the stave's edges so they become perpendicular to the faces. That way they'll fit together snugly and form a water-tight seal.

Dennis arranges 12 upright staves into a circle and cinches them firmly in place with temporary metal hoops. He levels stave ends and begins smoothing the joints where the staves' edges meet. Dennis employs a one-handed scorp to smooth the inside bucket surface as well.

A special plane, the hawksbill croze, cuts a dado near the bottom of all the staves. The plane's large semicircular wooden fence guides the hawksbill cutter around the inside of the bucket parallel to the ends of the staves. Coopers refer to this dado as the croze. The croze will house the bucket's head. Scheel fashions the bucket's bottom head from a

solid board. He feathers its edges so they fit neatly into the croze. Dennis loosens the bottom hoop and coaxes the head into place. Then he replaces temporary hoops with permanent ones, repeatedly pounding them down, thus cramming stave edges together and snugging them up around the head.

About Wood

This month, September 2016, we consider the Common Apple. Apple (malus sylvestris), is a small to medium tree from the family Rosaceae, the rose family. Malus sylvestris was introduced into Britain by the Romans and is now found throughout the world. There are many species and thousands of varieties. The Apple tree is found worldwide in temperate zones and at the higher elevations in tropical areas.

Recall that in previous columns, we have defined the Modulus of Rupture (MOR), the Modulus of Elasticity (MOE), Crush Strength, and Janka Hardness. We will continue to use those terms. Most of the other terms are generally well understood and will not be defined further. If you have questions about other terms or questions about a specific wood, contact

Here is a summary of the characteristics of the **Common Apple**:

Distribution: throughout temperate United States

Tree size: 13-30 ft (4-9 m) tall; 1 ft (.3 m) trunk diameter; trees in the wild may be larger

Average Dried Weight: 52 lbs/ft³ (830 kg/m3)

Specific Gravity: (Basic, 12% MC): 0.61, 0.83

Modulus of Rupture (MOR): 12,800 lbf/in² (88.3 MPa)

Modulus of Elasticity (MOE): 1,270,000 lbf/in² (8.76 GPa)

Crush Strength: 6,030 lbf/in² (41.6 MPa) **Janka Hardness:** 1,730 lb_f (7,700 N)

Shrinkage: Radial, 5.6%; Tangential, 10.1%;

Volumetric, 17.6%; T/R Ratio, 1.8

Heartwood Appearance: light reddish or grayish brown to a deeper red/brown; can have darker and lighter bands of color

Sapwood Appearance: pale cream color

Grain/Texture: grain is straight with a very fine, uniform texture

Stability: high shrinkage rate; large amount of seasonal movement; season the wood in steps to minimize later movement

Relative strength: excellent

Decay Resistance: non-durable for heartwood de-

cay

Workability: somewhat difficult due to high density; burns easily when machined; glues, stains, finishes, and turns well

Odor: faint sweet scent when worked

Toxicity: none **Potency:** very low

Toxicity Source: dust, as for any wood

Reaction: none

Sustainability: not threatened

Uses: fine furniture, tool handles, carving, mallet heads, turned items, musical instruments like dulcimers

Typical Cost: not widely available except in apple growing regions; expensive and usually only available in small sizes


