After many years of seasoning in the shop Travis extricated the bowl from the surrounding root ball and to embellish added some turquoise, coral, and mother of pearl.

The winner of the night was **Cliff Whitehouse** with his walnut stool. Cliff having spent the last four months at sea found some inspiration along the saw and carved this stool so that there was not a straight line anywhere. One of Cliff's points on the stool was to carve the top to maximize comfort. The stool is nicely balanced, but Cliff wants to make another that is more delicate without compromising strength.
