President's Corner

Our January meeting took a form that we would like to do somewhat regularly in the future: Informal gathering around multiple workstations, demonstrating a number of topics pertinent to woodworking. Many such meetings might have purely demonstration, but there should be an opportunity for workstations which provide hands-on experience. This sort of meeting has been well received and also provides an opportunity to socialize as well as participating in the topics of each workstation.

Our February and March meetings will have a similar setup, but with a twist: In February we will encourage members to Bring Your Own Plane (BYOP) for the purpose of tuning them up for the March meeting during which we will use our freshly tuned plane in a Japanese “Keduroukai” hand plane competition.

We have a number of projects on the burner for this calendar year:

Tom Mancuso chairs a committee organized to search for a celebrity presented to give an in depth presentation, or a class. Such a presented will incur expenses which must be reimbursed by The Guild. Such a presentation will not be free to members, but the Guild will likely subsidize a substantial cost of the program so that member costs can be kept at a minimum.

We are exploring a multi tiered membership, with different fees for students, seniors, regular members. We are hoping to join forces with the Rocky Mountain Wood Turners such that members of either group can join both clubs for a nominal extra charge.

We are also investigating the likelihood of renting space for a Guild/Turners shop. Such an undertaking will require collaboration with the Wood Turners in order to have a critical mass of members who might be interested in the additional cost. Memberships with shop privileges will be necessarily a good deal more expensive than regular memberships and will require overcoming some logistical hurdles. It is not clear that the high rents for suitable space in Denver will allow us to actually pull this off, but we will

put critical pen and paper to evaluate the possibility. It will also require an increased level of volunteer effort by members. So heads up, folks, with or without these changes, we will be asking for more involvement from our members.

On another note, we are adding a new Guild sponsor. Bridge City Toolworks has agreed to give Guild members a 10% discount on their products (except, of course, those items which are already on sale). 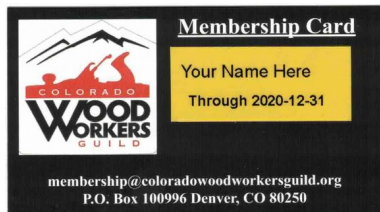

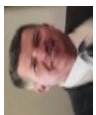
