Show and Tell

The show and tell items at the September meeting included entries from five members.

First up was Dale Bowlin, showed us a funeral urn. We make these for the unclaimed cremains of people who have served in one of our military branches. This is done in cooperation with the Vietnam Veterans of America. At the moment we need some additional urns and Dale brought this in to show how to make one. Here is Dale's urn:



The urn is made with Red Oak repurposed from a Church Pew, joinery is done with Festool Dominos and Dowels. It is finished with Light Walnut Watco.

Next up is a Salt and Pepper shaker from our Vice President Devon. These were her first woodworking project made when she was eleven years old. Here are Devon's Shakers



They are made from Maple and Cherry, and they were finished with beeswax.

Next is a table made by Jim Barry. Jim's Table is made from Walnut and Alder finished with a wipe on poly. Here is Jim's table:



Next, we have a Tea Light made by Dennis Edmounds. It is made from Maple, Walnut and Mesquite Scraps and finished with Tung Oil



Finally we had two entries from Don Prorak.

The first was a Trivit made from Cherry, Oak, Walnut and repurposed wine bottle corks! He finished the Trivit with Maloof Poly/Oil



Second were some bottle stoppers he made from Hempwood, Maple and "some kind of hardwood". These are turned using various techniques and finished with Spray Laquer.



The winner of the night was Jim Barry and his table.

Meeting Presentations

September 2021 Meeting

On 21 September, 2021, we were honored to have a guild presentation by Mr. Ethan Hutchinson, of Ethanhutchinson.com, where he displays an amazing talent for building furniture in the Maloof and Nakashima styles. He also has a woodworking school and is expecting it to start up again in the spring. Mr. Hutchinson presentation was on balancing furniture design.

Mr. Hutchinson started the discussion by showing slides of a commission he is doing that involves a large cherry table and a set of chairs to match. Apparently, the customers specified an interest in Cabriole legs, which he provided for the chairs, in cherry. He had difficulty with the support base of the table, as he felt that cabriole legs would create too weak of a table support, as the top weighs close to 500 pounds. So first he tried a pedestal base design, but ended up with a Nakashima styled conoid curve design that reflected the design of the chairs. He explained how he created the top from 2 slabs of cherry and a 1/8" spline between them. He explained the use of faux slabbing, i.e., creating a fake live edge to the slabs.

Mr. Hutchinson advised that when designing, and you have no idea on how to build it, build each component separately. With his 3-dimensional curves, he incorporates roughing out on the bandsaw, then dominoes for assembly.

He concluded the presentation with advice on design. He recommended we go to Tage Frid's or Norm Abrams' books for design inspiration. In addition, he uses the Sketchup software for presentation to the customers, but paper sketches for the actual design effort.

October 2021 Meeting

Our October 19 meeting presenter will be by the Denver Rockler store manager **Rich Johnson**. Mr. Johnson's topic will be <u>Finishing The Finish.</u> He plans to explain the current finishes available, the old standbys, and what the manufacturers fail to tell you about finishing. His objective is to help us get a mirror smooth finish every time. As many of you know, Mr. Johnson has been the manager of the Denver Rockler store for quite a long time. He has been an eminent resource for all things woodworking and he is an expert on finishing techniques. He is cognizant of new products and how and when to use them.

I am sure, that we all can learn something new from Rich on October 19th.

About Wood

In this month, October 2021, we look at **Verawood (Bulnesia arborea; syn. Bulnesia sarmientoi)**, is a small to medium size evergreen flowering tree from the caltrop (Zygophyllaceae) family. **Verawood** is also known as Maracaibo lignumvitae, guayacan, and bera cuchivaro.

Recall that in previous columns, we have defined the Modulus of Rupture (MOR), the Modulus of Elasticity (MOE), Crush Strength, and Janka Hardness. We will continue to use those terms. Verawood

Here is a summary of the characteristics of the Verawood tree:

Distribution: Native to coastal areas of Colombia and Venezuela **Tree size**: Typically 40 - 50 ft (12-15 m) tall; 1-2 ft (.3-.6 m) trunk diameter; very mature, old growth trees can be over 100 feet tall and 2 foot in diameter Average Dried Weight: 74 lbs/ft3 (1,190 kg/m3) Specific Gravity: (Basic, 12% MC): 1.01, 1.19 **Modulus of Rupture** (MOR): 26,900 lb_f/in² (185.5 MPa) **Modulus of Elasticity** (MOE): 3,573,000 lb_f/in² (24.64 GPa) **Crush Strength**: 13,2900 lb_f/in² (91.7 MPa) Janka Hardness: 3,710 lb_f (16,520 N) **Shrinkage**: Radial, $\approx 6\%$; Tangential, $\approx 8\%$; Volumetric, $\approx 13\%$; T/R Ratio, ≈ 1.3 Heartwood Appearance: Heartwood can range from pale yellowish olive to deeper forest green or dark brown to almost black; will darken with age; sapwood is pale yellow and nicely distinguishable from heartwood Grain/Texture: Grain is straight to spiraled or slightly interlocked: fine even texture with very high natural luster Stability: Dries very slowly; drenched with oil and resins **Relative strength**: High Decay Resistance: Considered one of the most durable woods in the world; outlasts most treated timbers Workability: Difficult to work with hand or machine tools because of high density; will dull cutting edges quickly; recommend light passes with cutters; difficult to glue because of oil content; turns nicely and will take a high polish; finishes well **Odor**: Perfume-like fragrance Toxicity: Reported to cause sneezing and like Lignum Vitae, may cause skin irritation Potency: Low to moderate Toxicity Source: Wood dust **Reaction**: Sneezing and possible skin irritation Sustainability: Is listed in CITES Appendices; reported by the IUCN as being conservation dependent Uses: Boat building, tool handles, mallet heads, bearings, bushings, pulley wheels, heavy construction, and turned items **Typical Cost**: Mid to upper range of imported exotic woods **Comments**: Similar in appearance and working characteristics to Lignum Vitae; trade of Lignum Vitae is restricted; Verawood is a popular substitute, but even then, there are some restrictions. Verawood trees have been brought into Florida as ornamentals.
