Show and Tell

We had a pretty light turnout at the September meeting, and as a result, the S&T had entries from only two members, yours truly and Scott Roth, our resident marquetry expert. If you were unable to attend the meeting, either in person or via Zoom it can be viewed online at the guild's website <u>here</u>. I've added a link to the start of each S&T portion below. You might have to "right click" and select "Open Hyperlink" to get to the video.

First, we had Scott's entry. Scott showed off a simple box he purchased at Michael's for a couple of bucks, which he dressed up with marquetry made from various veneers. This part of S&T may be viewed <u>here</u>.





Second, I brought in an old Fillister plane which I found at an Antique festival near Syracuse NY. I was just examining the plane when the booth owner came up and said I could have it for \$20. I didn't really need it but couldn't pass it up due to the price. A Fillister plane is essentially a rabbet plane with the addition of a fence and a depth stop. After some googling, I have come to believe the plane was made in the early part of the 1800s. I cleaned it up, sharpened the iron, made the fence and the depth stop work (they were both frozen in place) and brought it to the meeting to share with my fellow woodworkers. This part of S&T may be viewed here.





The plane is made by King & Peach Hull (according to the makers name stamped in the body). The blade is made by Maw & Staley's. This company operated under both names somtime between 1825 and 1833. Based on this I think the plane was made in the early 1800s.

As I did not make the plane, it was presented only for S&T not to be voted on. So we really had only one entry. And the winner was Scott Roth with his "Marquetry Enhanced Box", shown below receiving his Rockler Gift Card.

Meeting Presentations

September 2022 Meeting

On September 20, 2022, we had the privilege of hosting Mr. Deneb Puchalski, of Lie Nielsen Toolworks.

The presentation starts at about 1 hour and 02 minutes into the video and goes to the end of the meeting at 2 hours and 10 minutes.

Mr. Puchalski reported on the state of Lie Nielsen at the present time. Because of COVID, there was a large uptick in sales, for the good. But on the bad side, there was a 30percent attrition with employees, which slowed down the manufacturing and delivery of their products. Because of this, Lie Nielsen has focused on providing their 4 core tools, in the highest quality way possible. Those 4 core tools are:

- Dimensioning and surface planes- Bench plane, jack plane, smoothing plane, and a jointer plane
- Specialty Planes The recommended planes any shop should have is: the block plane, shoulder plane and router plane. A plow plane is optional.
- A set of chisels in a range of sizes.
- Hand saws A rip cut that chisels between the fibers and a crosscut to sever across the fibers.

Mr. Puchalski discussed the state of woodworking today as a field filled with so many more high-quality artists than ever existed. Furniture used to be for practical applications, but people are turning it into a true art form. "Most of the people doing that work don't give themselves the credit they should."

Mr. Puchalski answered questions regarding sharpening techniques, use of scrapers, how to get the best performance out of various hand planes, pros and cons of different handsaws, the #8 jointer plane and the efficacy of hand tools versus power tools-he believes that for one-off applications, hand tools can be much faster than power tools, and a lot more comfortable to use.

He reported that Lie Nielsen is expecting to get back into the demonstration circuit in 2023 at a woodworking show in Havana, Iowa. Until then, he recommends we check out the Lie Nielsen videos on the YouTube channel.

About Wood

For this month of October 2022, we consider **Sycamore**. The most common Sycamore is **American Sycamore** with the scientific name **Platanus occidentalis**. The American Sycamore, one of three North American sycamore species, is widely distributed through the Eastern United States. There is also the European Sycamore.

Recall that in previous columns, we have defined the Modulus of Rupture (MOR), the Modulus of Elasticity (MOE), Crush Strength, and Janka Hardness. We will continue to use those terms. Most of the other terms are generally well understood and will not be defined further. Sycamore

The Sycamore species is harvested regularly and generally available throughout its range. The American Sycamore is also known as American Plane, American Planetree, Buttonball Tree, Buttonwood, Sycamore, and Planetree. This Sycamore has one of the largest leaves of all American hardwoods.

Here is a summary of the characteristics of Sycamore:

Common Name(s): Sycamore, American Plane, American Planetree, Buttonball Tree, Buttonwood,

and Planetree

Scientific Name: Platanus occidentalis

Distribution: Eastern North America, from Southern Great Lakes to the Gulf of Mexico

Tree size: 75-120 ft (23-37 m) tall; 3-8 ft (1.0-2.4 m) trunk diameter

Average Dried Weight: 34 lbs/ft3 (545 kg/m3) Specific Gravity: (Basic, 12% MC): .46, .55

Modulus of Rupture (MOR): 10,000 lbf/in2 (69.0 MPa) Modulus of Elasticity (MOE): 1,420,000 lbf/in2 (9.79 GPa)

Crush Strength: 5,380 lbf/in2 (37.1 MPa)

Janka Hardness: 770 lbf (3,430 N)

Shrinkage: Radial, 5.0%; Tangential, 8.4%; Volumetric, 14.1%; T/R Ratio, 1.7

Overall Color/Appearance: Similar to maple; Sycamore is predominantly comprised of sapwood

Heartwood Appearance: Reddish brown

Sapwood Appearance: White to light tan; distinct ray flecks in quarter sawn; sometimes

called "Lacewood"

Grain/Texture: Fine, even texture similar to maple; interlocked grain

Stability: Moderate to excellent; will warp when plain sawn

Relative strength: Moderate

Decay Resistance: Poor; susceptible to insect attack

Workability: Works easily with both hand and machine tools; moderately hard and medium weight; interlocked grain can be troublesome in surfacing; glues, stains, and finishes well; responds poorly to

steam bending

Odor: Odorless, tasteless, and stain-free

Toxicity: Standard health risks with wood dust; no other issues

Potency: Low

Toxicity Source: Dust **Reaction**: Respiratory

Sustainability: Generally available; not threatened

Uses: Veneer, plywood, interior trim, pallets, flooring, furniture, turned objects, kitchenware

Typical Cost: Moderate price; higher for quartersawn (most common)
