Safety (Part Two CWG Workshop)

This is the second in a series of articles on workshop safety extracted from our new Guild Safety Guidelines (still in first draft form). Please feel free to comment directly to me at edmondsdennis670@gmail.com.

B. Shop Management

1. Maintain Good Shop Lighting

You can't work safely without seeing your work clearly.

Do

- Assure ample overhead LED lighting across the whole shop
- Use task lights focused on the work

Do Not

Do not work in a dark shop or with shadows on your work

2. Maintain an Organized Shop

Disorganization is inefficient and unsafe.

Do

- Keep shop surfaces and walkways clear
- Return tools to their proper place in drawers or on a pegboard
- Store lumber securely on lumber racks or in vertical storage bins
- Store short pieces in clear plastic boxes on shelvel
- Store supplies on shelves or drawers

Do Not

Never leave work surfaces and walkways dirty or cluttered

3. Practice Good House Keeping

A dirty or cluttered shop can cause injury.

Do

- Maintain good lighting to avoid accidents and eye strain
- Sweep floors regularly and clean up liquids immediately to avoid slips and falls
- Keep work surfaces clear so there is room to work safely
- Place scrap in the scrap bin as you make cuts
- Use drop-cords for power tools located in the middle of the shop to avoid tripping

Do Not

• Don't allow layers of dust to accumulate on equipment or heaters.

4. Manage Airborne Dust

Airborne dust can make you very sick and may even cause a fire or explosion.

Do

- Wear a dust mask
- Collect dust at the source with a dust collector or shop vacuum
- Work outside or open the doors to facilitate good cross ventilation
- Remove indoor dust from the air with an air filtration system

Do Not

- Never sand in a closed environment without dust collection
- Do not sand near sparks or an open flame
- Never smoke near solvent vapors

5. Use Machine Safety Fixtures, Devices and Guards

Safety fixtures, devices and guards exist for a reason.

Do

- Read each machine manual carefully before using the machine
- Get help from a more experienced woodworker if you have questions
- Use fences, miter gauges and jigs to stabilize materials
- Use push sticks to move materials

Do Not

Never remove machine safety equipment and guards

6. Manage Fire and Explosion Risk

Fire and explosion can occur suddenly in your workshop.

Do

- Spread oily rags out to dry before disposal or place them in a closed bucket filled with water
- Know where fire exits are located
- Keep a fire extinguisher handy
- Know how to report a fire

Do Not

- To avoid spontaneous combustion, never pile oily rags up or put them in the trash until they are thoroughly dry
- Never use or store flammable solvents, adhesives and finishes near sparks or flames

7. Manage Electrical Hazards

Do

- Inspect and repair all damaged power cords
- Only use a grounded extension cord which is rated for use with that specific tool

Do Not

- Do not expose power tools to rain.
- Never use power tools in a wet or damp environment
- Never remove the grounding pin on a plug
- Don't use power tools with damaged cords
- Never string extension cords across walkways
- Never use the cord for carrying, pulling, or unplugging a tool

Education Corner - The Chechen Tree

The Chechen Tree could kill you!



At least, that is what early Colonial explorers thought. When Christopher Columbus landed in the Virgin Islands, some of the sailors died after eating the fruit from the trees.

Known as **black poisonwood** or **Caribbean rosewood**, **Chechen** wood's scientific name is *Metopium brownei*. Chechen is native to the Caribbean region. Due to its abundance, the wood of this tree is a valuable source of lumber in Central America and the West Indies. Most vendors of the wood indicate it is safe to handle once processed. However, at a recent scholarly conference, Thomas Anderson, a graduate student from Yale, presented his work with the species. He had made a table using kiln-dried chechen. Just as the colonial chronicles indicated, he noticed similar effects of the toxicity on his hands and arms.



The name 'Chechen' is from the Mayan language. There is even myth associated with the tree: the legend of the Chechén and Chakáh trees. According to the myth, Kinich and Tizic were two brothers and great warriors. Kinich was known for his kindness, Tizic for his ruthlessness. Both brothers, however, fell in love with a beautiful young woman named Nicté Há.

Like Apollo chasing Daphne, Kinich and Tizic both pursued Nicté Há. Eventually, the brothers ended up fighting for her love to the death. When the gods learned of this tragedy, however, they returned Tizic to Earth as the poisonous Chechen tree. On the other hand, his kinder brother, Kinich, was returned as the Chacá tree. The leaves of this tree provide an antidote to the poison of the Chechén. But what happened to the lovely Nicté Há?

In Greek mythology, Daphe escaped Apollo's pursuit when Zeus transformed her into the Laurel tree. In Maya legend, Nicté Há died of sadness at the loss of the two brothers. She was turned into a beautiful water flower with white leaves.



If you're ever in Cancún, be on the lookout for the Chechén tree. You will have a great story to tell your friends.


