Local volunteer veterans spent months going to funeral homes, inventorying unclaimed remains and then cross-checking the names against military records to identify 27 unclaimed remains of veterans.

Next, we can see Jason and his Box/Stopper.






Bob and his Routed Fruit Bowl are shown next.






Jim and his Stool. Note the inlaid medallion in the last pic.

Meeting Presentations

February 2024 Meeting

On February 20th, 2024, the Guild welcomed a rising star in the world of hybrid woodworking Kailee Bosch. Kailee started turning when she was 6. Having recently finished her bachelor's degree in art, Kailee now combines traditional techniques with CNC work and well-developed turning skills to create one-of-a-kind furniture. She explained her technique for furniture building as the development of functional objects. One example is her side table, which includes bronze-casted joinery she made herself. Designed and built by Kailee for her university Capstone Project, she used ash, bronze, and brass.



In all, Kaillee showed what the future of our craft will look like. First, combine CAD design on Rhino with traditional techniques like the 5-7 rule for rounding over tight corners (Dan Faia explains this technique well in this YouTube short: https://www.youtube.com/shorts/MqB9I76T0MQ). Then add solid woodturning skills with a deep knowledge of design for wood. What you get is a talented artist at the start of her career, whose art will be exciting to follow in the years to come. Education Corner

Early Furniture - The Mayan 'Tortuguero Box'

Furniture historians, like Oscar Fitzgerald, teach us that the earliest documented furniture in the USA was a chest made in the 1640s, attributed to Thomas Mulliner, a joiner from England's New Haven Colony. But it's interesting to find examples of woodworking from earlier times.

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One such example is the Mayan 'Tortuguero Box'. Made nearly 1000 years before Mulliner's chest, the Tortuguero Box includes carved hieroglyphs that tell the story of a dynastic lineage of the Maya. Michael Coe, in his 1974 article, "A carved wooden box from the classical maya civilization", asked how, "such a perishable object could have survived almost 13 centuries of destructive forces" (51). The tropical conditions of the Maya lowlands have not allowed many wooden artifacts to survive for archeological study.

It's hard to believe that any woodwork would have survived the harsh conditions of the Mesoamerican climate. However, the Tortuguero box is a famous example to the contrary.



The box was likely found in a relatively dry cave in the area. However, while archeologists have studied the hieroglyphs, one question I want to know more about is the box itself: its construction, the techniques, the wood used, the broader significance for the study of Mesoamerican woodworking. Luckily, we have some information to start with at the Library of Congress. One last thing, this box was made using Sapodilla wood. A fruit tree species native to Central America, the Sapodilla is also known as the 'chicle' or 'chewing gum' tree, since the sap of this species is used to make chewing gum. So, next time you see someone chewing a piece of gum, tell them they can thank a woodworker!

They work with local arborists and forest agencies to source community trees that are planned for removal because of development or because they're hazards, dying or diseased. They also strive to find environmentally friendly uses for their wood byproducts. They divert

shavings, offcuts, and sawdust to be used as biochar, compost amendment, and growing medium for mushrooms.

Finally, Urban Forest Mill offers custom milling, vacuum kiln drying, and industrial woodshop services. These include glue-ups, planing, straight-line ripping, wide-belt sanding, and wide-project flattening. This means Urban Forest Mill can take your heirloom tree from log to finished slabs or dimensional lumber on their modern, state-of-the-art equipment. Or Urban Forest Mill can dry and mill slabs or thicker lumber that you already own.
